Minister's Letter



As we move through my 11th year as your minister, I remain convinced that Addison County and the world beyond need our

congregation to thrive. But what a challenge! We live in a society constantly pushing and pulling us away from congregational life.

As one congregant I haven't seen in worship in a long time told me, "I won't say I'm not coming back. I am not 'not coming back.' But I don't know when it will be possible for us."

I don't second-guess the choices of congregants who say things like this to me. I'm not walking in their shoes. But I miss them. And I wonder how we will thrive without them. I take some comfort in the pre-Covid advice of Rev. Lynn Ungar, shared during 2019 in Quest, the monthly newsletter of the UU Church of the Larger Fellowship, She said, "When we start with wondering, we are never wrong."

Hmm, so let's say the question is, "How will CVUUS serve aging Baby Boomers while attracting many more families?" We have to wonder. Boomers like me faced plenty of upheaval and social conflict as we began raising our families. But I believe we also had more reason to be hopeful about the future. Still, I retain my faith that if we wonder together about this question, we'll end up with abundant ideas to explore.

Here's something else I wonder about. We UU's imagine the Beloved Community we seek as joyful and happy. It also invites us into awe and reverence for what we find in Nature, including human nature at its best. But I wonder how to square that with our call to struggle against the injustices, ugliness, and environmental threats around us. I don't have the answer. The best I can say about this predicament is that it seems to guarantee us choices that matter.

With all this in mind (and heart), I pray the spirit of wonder protects us from the arrogance of dogmatic claims and lazy answers. I pray it leads us away from the slippery slopes of hatred and inflexibility. May it hold us as a powerful spiritual form of gravity, reliably drawing our attention to the many forms of Life-giving Love we may practice. Blessed be, Rev. Barnaby
