wreaths. The Harringtons host hikes and bonfires and had one for Christmas Eve to which the Brightmans came. That's radical love!



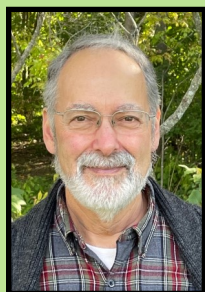

Minister's Letter

As I head off to Thanksgiving's meal, I feel Christmas looming. It's an occupational hazard. Christmas is a challenging event in our church calendar for many UU ministers. What do we do with the Biblical birth story of Jesus in a denomination descended from but no longer partial to Christianity?

In my dreams, I see the invitingly decorated Sanctuary strained to its occupancy limits. I see all of us, including many folks alive only in memory, gathered together in song and joyful celebration. I hear deeply-felt prayers for the common good – even the silent ones. I imagine a fellowship time afterward of was-sail and baked treats, during which a light snow begins.

But I know better that reality will be more complicated. Our world and our congregation are still coping with the impact of the pandemic, climate change is gathering steam, and, as usual, political and social strife are rampant. UU's are all over the place in what they need most from this and other winter holidays.

Whatever unfolds, it will be left to us to bless each other. The Advent month is a form of active waiting that encourages that. The Christmas stories wither if we don't find our own uplifting roles in them.

As I wait this year, I will be praying that we are blessed with the courage to encounter disappointment and sorrow without despairing. I was heartened by our congregational conversation on the project to update the UU Principles by comments that reason's role in a sound faith needs to be affirmed even as we move for the first time to center our Principles on Love.

I agree. That will help us gain clarity on what healthy worship might look and feel like. I once had trouble seeing anything positive in the very word "worship." Some of you still do. I believe our reexamination of our Principles, and the origins of the word, will also help us see ways to avoid handing control of defining worship to those who have given it a bad name. 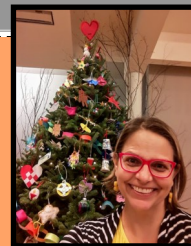

December "Share the Plate" Donee: ISC

Based in Montpelier and founded by VT governor Madeline Kunin and her policy advisor George Hamilton in 1991, after a trip to Bulgaria, **ISC (sustain.org)** has worked with thousands of communities, organizations, institutions and companies in more than 30 countries in support of its mission.

ISC believes strong communities are the foundation of a peaceful and healthy planet for humanity. *"Throughout the world, people want the same things: access to clean air and water; economic opportunities; a safe and healthy place to raise their kids; shelter; lifelong learning; a sense of community; and the ability to have a say in the decisions that affect their lives."* The organization now works in partnership with government agencies, businesses, universities, and other organizations to develop, test, and share, practical solutions that reduce harmful emissions and improve people's lives in the United States, China, India, and Bangladesh. A few of their specific projects include:

- Tackling the air pollution, toxic effluents, water mismanagement, and energy inefficiencies in Asia's manufacturing sector, resulting from the region's rapid industrialization.
- Developing Climate Resiliency- Turning a Threat into an Asset in Suburban Miami-Dade County and the Puget Sound in Washington state.
- Accelerating the emissions reductions of 12 partner cities, and capacitating trainers to bring program insights to Chinese scale.

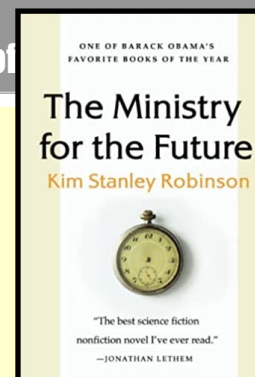

The Ministry for the Future Book Club

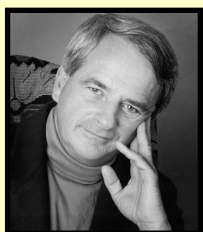

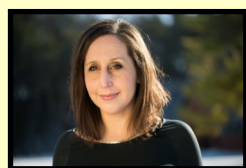
Vermont Book Shop Book Talk Series

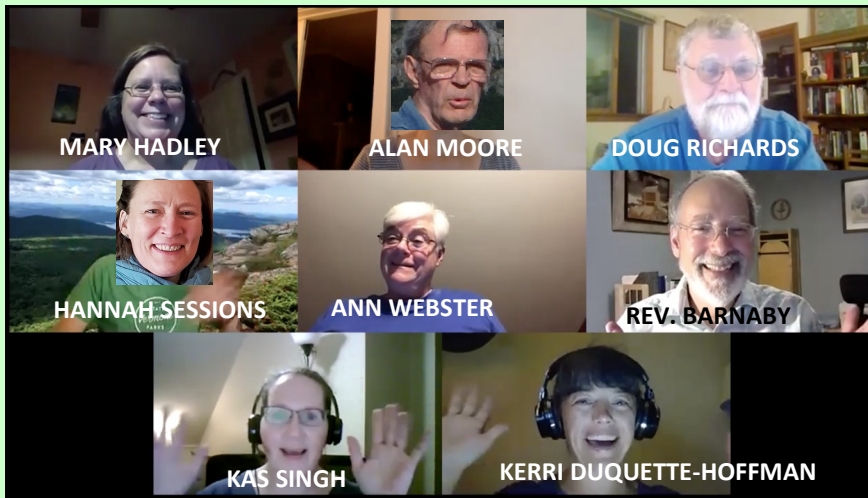

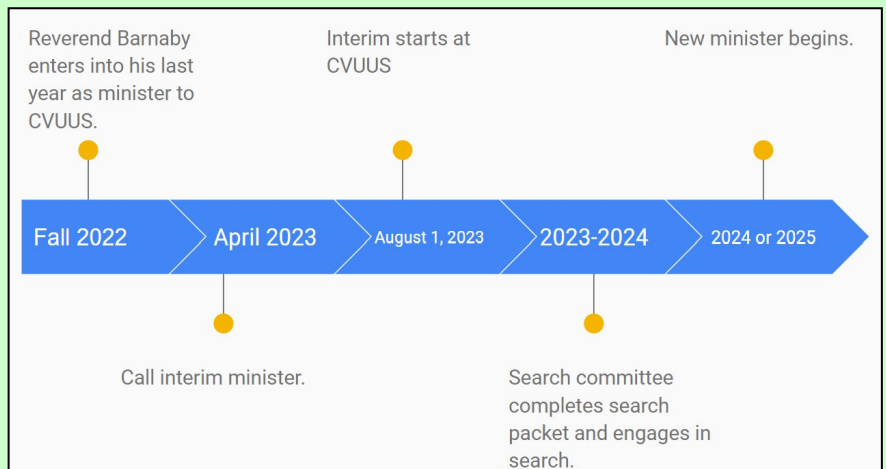


FROM YOUR CVUUS BOARD 2022-2023

Over the past couple months, the Board has been preparing for some exciting initiatives that the congregation will be engaged with in the coming months. Included among these are the following:

1) In preparing for the Interim

Minister search this spring, a subcommittee of the Board will be inviting two congregants to join them in overseeing that search. **Folks who may be interested in participating can reach out to Kas Singh**, Board Secretary and member of the subcommittee (with Hannah Sessions and Alan Moore). An organizing meeting of the Interim Minister Search Team will take place in mid-December, with most of the work taking place during May. Note that participating in the Interim Search will have no effect either way on the subsequent selection, later in the transition process, of members of a Settled Minister Search Team.



2) Rev. Barnaby has shared with the congregation over the past few weeks, **the UUA is currently engaged in a regular review of its Principles and Purposes, as outlined in Article II of the association's by-laws**. A draft of proposed revisions (with "Love" at its center) is being circulated by the commission charged with overseeing the revision process, requesting comments from congregations and individual members (consult the UUA website at uua.org for further details.) Concurrently, CVUUS is engaged in a process of considering the congregation's response to a proposed 8th principle. As Rev. Barnaby has suggested, these initiatives represent a nourishing and exciting opportunity for members of CVUUS—and the denomination as a whole—to consider who we are and how we want to be in the world. At its next meeting on Tuesday, December 13, the Board will be discussing how it can help facilitate these processes over the coming months. (continued on next page)

Two practical considerations will form part of the Board's conversation:

- First, we will be accelerating the process for **selecting CVUUS's delegates to the 2023 General Assembly**, which is scheduled for June 2024. The UUA's General Assembly is the highest governing body of the UUA, and it is an important opportunity for congregations to share their voices and influence the direction of the denomination.



Two practical considerations will form part of the Board's conversation:

- First, we will be accelerating the process for **selecting CVUUS's delegates to the 2023 General Assembly in June**, primarily to enhance the congregation's participation in a series of ongoing remote conversations over the course of the winter and spring regarding the draft Article II revisions. **If you are interested in being a delegate to the General Assembly this year (which will take place remotely as well as on-site in Pittsburgh in June) contact Doug Richards or Alan Moore—or any other Board member.**
- Second, the Board will be discussing its role in helping to formulate a process and timetable leading to a congregational response to the proposed 8th principle. We hope to share the results of our discussions with the congregation in the weeks to come. Stay tuned!

Proposed "8th" UU Principle: Dismantling Systemic Racism

"We, the member congregations of the Unitarian Universalist Association, covenant to affirm and promote: journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions."

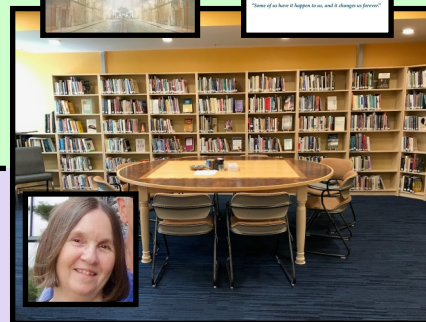
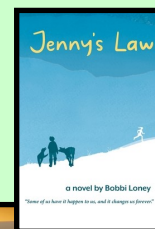
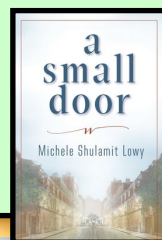
