### Minister's Letter

I feel blessed by fruitful questions that leave me plenty to think about. There's nothing like starting each day with nutritious food for thought stored in your mental pantry.

I received such a blessing recently while leading a discussion on the proposed 8th Principle. This proposed amendment to our national by-laws asks UU congregations to "journey toward spiritual wholeness" in a specific way. It prescribes that we do so by working to build a "Beloved Community" through actions that "dismantle racism and other oppressions." There's more to it than that, but this is enough for what I want to share here.

The blessing I got was a fretful question about the meaning of the word "wholeness." I didn't say so in my

initial response, but my ongoing work on the answer has led me to the same question about another family of words: bless, blessed, and blessing. What do those words mean to me?

The Rev. Rebecca Parker addresses that in one of our favorite readings, <u>Choose to Bless</u> <u>the World.</u> Parker sets the table by affirming that each of us matters:

"Your gifts—whatever you discover them to be—can be used to bless or curse the world."

She speaks to us as individuals, but doesn't stop there. There's more to choosing to use your gifts to bless the world, she concludes:

"...the choice will draw you into community,
the endeavor shared,
the heritage passed on,
the companionship of struggle,
the importance of keeping faith...,

None of us alone can save the world.

Together—that is another possibility, waiting."

# Proposed "8th" UU Principle: Dismantling Systemic Racism

"We, the member congregations of the Unitarian Universalist Association, covenant to affirm and promote: journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved
Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions."



I believe the 8th Principle points toward that possibility. I believe we should adopt it for CVUUS without significant changes in its language and without waiting longer to see what happens at the national level. Many UU congregations have already done so. The Principle has many ambiguities beyond what is meant by "wholeness" and even, in my view, some flaws. But I choose not to see them as show stoppers. They are prompts for questions that are potential blessings. All that is required is that we respond with an intent to model the Beloved Community we are called to become. I look forward to sharing this particular journey toward wholeness in the coming weeks. Blessed be, Rev. B

#### **LESS**



who are they?" since over the pandemic—the past two and a half years—John and Kate have been scarce.... No doubt about it, they have been conservative about attending services and events at CVUUS for many reasons: aging parent care, autoimmune medical conditions, work, and other health reasons. But this is important: while they may have stayed away, they have remained connected...behind the scenes.

So they said YES to running the canvass because, for starters, they can model the living, breathing example of "coming in from the cold...to the warmth of community ... back in through the door..." and because they love this community.

Threshold Door Portal Love

In early conversations (with Rev. Barnaby, Doug Richards, Hannah Sessions, Ellen Flight and Mary Hadley), as they talked about "coming in from the cold," this gave rise to an image they are considering using — a woodblock print that son Charles made after he found an actual door in a piney wood in the middle of an island off Maine coast. He was young. He thought he had found a magic portal.

Kate and John look forward to putting fun into fundraising, and have spoken with Ronnie Romano and Asa Baker-Rouse about using our imaginations for fun renditions of musical numbers and to Poppy Rees about involving RE. They began brainstorming with the worship team so that canvas skits or songs or testimonials or announcements might be PART of the services, woven in, thematically relevant. WHY do they want this year's canvas to be integrated into worship? It's a big year. LOTS going on:

- We are preparing for a transition
- We are celebrating Rev. Barnaby's tenure
- We will welcome an Interim Minister
- Eventually we will go through a process and...welcome a new minister
- We are coming back to worship, post first phase of Covid.
- We are in transition.
- It is a complex, scary, hopeful world.
- Change makes some folks nervous, others love it.

After a year of independence, New Brackett joined the UUA late in 2021. Rev. Barnaby recently had a long chat with Rev. 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### FROM YOUR CYUUS BOARD 2022-2023

The Unitarian Universalist Association's (UUA) General Assembly (GA) is held every year at the



end of June. This year it will occur both virtually and in-person June

21-25 in Pittsburgh PA. **CVUUS** can choose four delegates to attend as voting members in the business sessions, but anyone can register and attend the many interesting and educational workshops and worship events. I have attended six General Assemblies in the last 20 years and have found them to be enriching and powerful events. In addition, it's a great way to meet other UUs from around the country and to learn how other congregations operate. You may learn that CVUUS is ahead of the game in some areas, but perhaps could learn from others' experiences.

While the business of the UUA may seem distant and unimportant to our Vermont CVUUS lives, decisions made at GA can impact our congregation. For example, at this year's GA, we will elect a new President for the next six years, and we will also vote for the first time on the revised Article II of the UUA Bylaws. The final vote on Article II will occur at the 2024 GA.

Article II of the UUA Bylaws, Principles and Purposes, is the foundation for all of the work of our UUA and its member congregations and covenanted communities. It is the covenant to which all of our congregations and covenanted communities pledge themselves when they become members of our UUA. A Study Commission was established by the UUA Board of Trustees to review Article II and recommend needed changes. This Commission has attempted to explain our seven existing Principles in textual and diagrammatic form to better describe what we as UUs are all about. It has also taken the so-called 8<sup>th</sup> Principle proposal regarding institutional and societal racism and folded it into the new recommend text. Official delegates (you could be one of them!) may then attend a mini-assembly in May where amendments to the revised Article II will be presented and discussed, before being presented to GA for a vote in June.

Here at CVUUS we will be discussing the revised Article II and also the possibility of adopting the 8<sup>th</sup> Principle as part of our own value system, in addition to what the General Assembly decides. There will be a discussion of this proposal on January 8<sup>th</sup> after the service. We plan to have a Congregational Meeting at the end of February to vote on whether or not to adopt the 8<sup>th</sup> Principle. If you would like to be one of the four delegates to attend GA this year and have the opportunity to vote on the revised Article II, let Doug Richards, our Congregational President, or Reverend Barnaby know of your interest. **Alan Moore** (See 2022 GA Video Review here)


