

Minister's Letter

I will miss writing these monthly letters to you when I retire, but the March letter will probably be the one I miss the least. March always feels extremely busy and broken up to me. When I look out on Sunday morning and notice who's missing, the reasons they might

be somewhere else seem countless.

It all unfolds as Winter and Spring struggle erratically for supremacy in a span of weeks that is, on average, Vermont's snowiest month. And it often ends up with everything bogged down in mud. It's a crucial month for financial planning for towns and schools, the State of Vermont, and CVUUS – a vital activity that is rarely high on anyone's list of joys. It's somehow fitting that Covid arrived in full force in March three years ago.

On the plus side, we will be kicking off March this year with the congregational meeting to vote on a social action covenant for our congregation. The language in the proposed covenant comes directly from nearly a decade of work and study by Black and other minority UU's who have proposed to the UUA it be included as an 8th principle in an effort to dismantle racism.

After hearing me speak from the pulpit and gathering feedback from several congregational meetings on the 8th principle, the Board decided to propose that we adopt the

language as a congregational covenant which provides more individual responsibility and a much broader roadmap toward our aspirations for CVUUS and for ourselves. Its approach to oppression in general can enrich almost everything else we gather to do to make the world more just, compassionate, and beautiful. What a potentially unifying and uplifting gift in busy times!

I hope those of you who have put off studying the proposed covenant will explore the materials we've posted or linked to on our website. Feel free too to ask me for links to past sermons of mine that I think are particularly relevant. The Board and I hope you'll attend the meeting for the vote after worship (onsite or remotely via Zoom) on March 5 even if you feel less than fully informed. I promise that whether or not we adopt the covenant formally, I will be sharing ways we can benefit from it throughout my remaining months as your minister.

Non-members are welcome to attend and participate in discussion, but may not vote. A quorum of members to attend is required.

"We commit to journey toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved Community through our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions."



Asian American Histories of the United States by Catherine Ceniza Choy, published by Beacon Press



Original and expansive, Asian American Histories of the United States is a nearly 200year history of Asian migration, labor, and community formation in the US. Reckoning with the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic and the surge in anti-Asian hate and violence, award-winning historian Catherine Ceniza Choy presents an urgent social history of the fastest growing group of Americans. The book features the lived experiences and diverse voices of immigrants, refugees, US-born Asian Americans, multiracial Americans, and workers from industries spanning agriculture to healthcare. Despite significant Asian American breakthroughs in politics, arts, and popular culture, a profound lack of understanding of Asian American history permeates American culture.


RELIGIOUS EXPLORATION

The 8th UU Principle in RE

Dismantling racism – and other oppressions – is the work of our whole Congregation, at all ages. It is intentional work which involves LEARNING – REFLECTION – ACTION.

We are very aware of this in our RE kids' program. It informs many choices that we make about what we do in RE, what we talk about and ask in RE, and what we bring into our RE spaces. We are still in an early phase of this work with the kids. And with ourselves, as RE leaders. We have a lot to learn.

Here are some <u>small</u> examples of how we are trying to "journey towards Beloved Community through dismantling racism and other oppressions in RE":



PICTURE BOOKS

Trying to have new purchases include people with a variety of skin colors, bodies, genders, sexual attractions, families, ethnicities and modern examples of different indigenous peoples

Using books in RE to discuss skin color, racism, equity, body diversity, gender spectrum

TIME FOR ALL AGES

People, characters, stories included are diverse with an aim to have the majority be BIPOC and limit stories that center around white people/characters


MATERIALS

Action figures, Playmobil people, board games, etc. that have a mix of skin colors and don't promote racial or gender stereotypes

Crayons and markers that come in over 20 different skin shades

VERMONT PRIDE PARADE

RE was the organizer for CVUUS marching in the Pride Parade this year, for the first time ever. The kids made flags for marchers to hold.



ABOLITION KITCHEN

This year, the kids have been joining with CVUUS adult congregants and cooking for Abolition Kitchen: a project connected to <u>Middlebury Showing Up for Racial Justice</u>, has been cooking and delivering delicious meals to Black activists and community members every Friday since June 2020.

Next year, we plan to do more rigorous anti-racism and anti-oppression education and action in RE.



Standing on the Threshold of Our Future 2023-24 Canvass Pledge Drive





Every year, members and friends of CVUUS personally support the loving mission of our congregation with gifts of time, fellowship, and money. What does CVUUS mean to you? Can you put a monetary value on how you feel, within the capacity of your personal budget?

Everyone is squeamish on the subject of money — folks come up with all kinds of other words for it — but, in fact, it is about reality. Our finance team has created a lean budget that asks for a 22% increase in order to provide overdue increases to personnel salaries, reinstate our fair share to the UUA, and anticipate increases to fixed costs. **So we ask ourselves:**

- 1. We have an amazing, dedicated and hardworking staff. Should they be paid a living wage? Can we walk the talk?
- 2. Over the next two years, we will launch our search for a new full time minister. Will we be able to offer an attractive compensation package so that we can bring our person of choice here? Will they be able to afford to live in Addison County?
- 3. Will we be able to maintain and run our beautiful campus, making it greener, more sustainable, and more accessible?
- 4. Will CVUUS be able to increase its impact and influence on matters of importance to our blessed community furthering its mission?

These are important conversations about stewardship. We believe you ought to feel empowered — joyful even — about your financial gifts to CVUUS. "To you I give, from you I receive."

We've met with Council of Ministries, the Board, Worship Team, Music Team, Facilities Team and the Choir and approached major donors. We seek 100% participation. On March 1st our Canvass letter will be mailed to all CVUUS members who have yet to pledge. Please feel free to contact us with your questions, or find us after Sunday services. 


March "Share the Plate" Donee: Homes First VT

CVUUS seeks to support Homes First VT, a group of 7-10 members who meet regularly to generate and leverage community partnerships in order to alleviate our housing crisis. This includes CVUUS

member Jean Terwilliger. Their long term vision is a village of 9-12 "right-sized" homes with a community gathering space situated within walking distance or on the bus line in Addison County. This is very intentionally as alternative to the affordable housing developments. Their short term goal is to build homes by the community, one by one. Hannaford Career Center has agreed to build one tiny house per year for as long as HomesFirst VT is the "middleman." They seek a minimum 3 acre lot for it and others to come.
