Minister's Letter

This is the second letter I'm writing on this bitterly cold and windy late-March afternoon. The weather makes me feel like I should be looking forward to **Mud Communion**, which we plan to celebrate

after the April 2nd worship service. For those of you unfamiliar with it, it results in our washing some mud off your hands as we repeat these words of blessing:

"When the Way turns to Mud, it remains the Way.
When you are there, we are with you.
As I wash your hands today. I am grateful that we find
ourselves walking together on the journey toward
Spring's promise of renewal."

CVUUS Covenant to Dismantle Systemic Racism and Other

Oppressions: "We commit to journey toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved Community through our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions."

But the letter I just finished writing has pushed me in another direction. It was to my wife, Michele, written at the request of a tour guide. My letters – and similar letters from family members of those on the tour – are to be delivered as a surprise. This makes sense if you know it's a tour of what's left – actually, mostly what isn't left – of Jewish Poland. It's primarily aimed at Jews connected in some way to the 3 million Polish Jews murdered during the Holocaust or the several hundred thousand more who survived the traumatic experience.

That includes people like the now dead parents of Eve, her childhood friend and current travel companion. Eve's parents met while trapped in the Jewish ghetto German established in the Polish city of Lodz; they married there and, against the odds, survived the death camps once the ghetto was destroyed. That's not Michele's only connection, but I'll leave it at that. As Michele said before they left, "This is a pilgrimage, not a vacation."

My letter to her left me wrestling with the contrast between the scale of the tragedy these millions of people and their survivors faced and our current challenges at CVUUS. The link calling to me is that while we live, each moment offers decisions that define our humanity. Within those moments, there are countless precious and sacred things to be noticed and encouraged. Writing to you, I'm reminded how grateful I am for the abundance of what is precious, sacred, humane, and hopeful in the moments we are fortunate to share at CVUUS.

It's mind-boggling in the best possible way. No wonder it feels so right to pray as we do in the hymn <u>Spirit of Life</u>: "Sing in my heart all the stirrings of compassion." Blessed Be, Rev. Barnaby

KID SPACE IN FELLOWSHIP HALL

In October of 2019, the Fall before COVID, the RE Council had <u>just</u> gotten a plan approved to **create a kid space in the Fellowship Hall**. We hoped to create a space that kids would find inviting and fun. A space that would help kids and families (and everyone) thrive at Social Hour and other congregational events in the Fellowship Hall.

We imagined it in the corner where the kid stuff currently is. We aimed for a space that would be attractive, flexible, and easily moved out of the room, if needed. Then COVID came. 2 years later, we put some materials in the corner and created a very simple kid space in the Fellowship Hall. It has been quite popular. And now it includes the lovely bench against the wall. Thanks Scott Barkdoll!

Now, in Spring 2023, we are ready to make our kid space dreams a reality!

And we need some help — more fully envisioning the space, finding and prepping furniture, getting the right rug, and more.

Some ideas:

- 10 x 12 rug that looks nice and hides stains and dirt
- Low table and chairs
- Soft/bean bag chairs and/or comfy place for sitting
- A "divider" where the kid space meets the rest of the space low cubby bench?
- A place for drawing: easel or wall whiteboard
- All the furniture needs to be easily moveable, for flexibility
- We want it to look nice, not just be toys and small furniture in a corner

Some questions:

- What ages do we hope will use this space?
- If it is aimed at young kids and toddlers, what about older kids and teens in the Fellowship Hall? Currently, the Fenn basement contains unused (but previously popular) ping pong and foosball tables...
- What about the walls in this kid space? Big removeable wall decals?



If you want to help design and assemble the space, please TALK TO ME.

If you have any of these things, please let me know:

- Table that easily seats 4: kid-height OR has legs that could be cut down
- 2-4 kid-sized chairs
- Low cubby kind of thing to use as a divider

I am hoping to have the space completed by the end of this church year, in early June. Or by late Summer, at the latest.

Standing on the Threshold of Our Future 2023-24 Canvass Pledge Drive

Sincere thanks to the many CVUUS members who have made their pledges to this year's canvass *Standing on the Threshold of Our Future*. With 64% of our members already committed to pledging so far, Kate and John want to emphasize how excited they

are about the "Future of CVUUS" in this important canvass.

Our success in achieving our ambitious goal will literally define our future and how effectively CVUUS will live and widely advocate for the values we hold dear.

The inherent worth and dignity of every individual is a value that we heard about this past Sunday in moving testimonials from member and guest speakers. And listening to the news this week, it is clearer than ever that our liberal religious community is more needed than ever to help make this world a more inclusive and just home to all.

As of the end of March, if we include the remaining "sustainers" pledges, we have \$210,066 pledged towards the canvass goal of \$327,934 which gets us to a carefully constructed draft of a balanced budget for fiscal year 2023-24.

Of the pledges that have been made, 38% of our members have increased their pledges. 38% of our members are maintaining their annual pledge amounts. 24% have had to lower



Barnaby's Pride Flag Theft Response: To the individual who ripped down and stole the Pride flag outside our Sanctuary Sunday afternoon (March 26), Thank you for noticing that our congregation supports everyone's human right to search for and express their sexual and gender identity in ways that do not harm others. We are disappointed you felt it necessary to steal in a destruc-

tive manner the flag representing our commitment to justice, freedom, and compassion.

Some of us wondered whether you needed one to carry this coming Friday in support of Outright Vermont's demonstration at the State House in Montpelier. We would have arranged to lend our flag or another to you if you had only asked us. Others speculated you were guided by fear or hatred of others who love themselves and the world in ways you've been taught are sinful. If so, we invite you into a circle of wider love that will ease your pain. Feel free to get in touch with me to discover more about our views -- you may find there's more to agree with than you thought.

Meanwhile, we invite everyone else in the community to watch for the flag to be replaced soon. This theft, of course, only reinforces our intent to stay true to our faith's commitment to affirm and promote the inherent worth and dignity of every person. Everyone's. Including our thief.


