Minister's Letter

What an amazing month May is going to be for us this year. We will find out who our interim minister will be (if that process goes smoothly) and when they will start serving the congregation. Our long-term financial structure and outlook is going to get some long-overdue, congregant-led scrutiny as we deal with the realities of who is participating in our communal life on

the back-end of Covid. We will be preparing for the June 3 Rhubarb Festival, a tasty and fun event for the wider community that has become something we are known for. And we will be searching for a successor to Ronnie who can maintain the tremendous momentum he created for music at CVUUS as our first Music Director.

On a more personal note, I expect to be a lot clearer by June about my plans for the first year of my retirement from serving as your minister. Some irons are currently headed toward the fire if not quite in it as I write this.

It seems like a good moment to share some of my thoughts about the challenges CVUUS faces, because they are also its opportunities. I'll need your help in the next couple of months figuring out what I can most fruitfully work on for you. A lot of it may be connected to these thoughts.

- Covid has undermined cross-generational life communities like ours, which is already in short supply in our society. It may be that instead of struggling to create multigenerational activities we currently need to focus on creating great points of connection for older and younger congregants separately. Make it a positive goal rather than something we've been forced into. Then, we should intentionally add to the planning the question: "Is there anything very simple we can throw into this activity or add to it to make those in the age group it wasn't planned for feel they are invited to be a part of it?" It's kind of a radical love question.
- Our new social action covenant can be a powerful and positive influence on almost
- everything we do. Let's hold it close and explore its potential each week with open minds and faithful hearts.
- Fun is not the same as joy. Let joy be our goal and fun emerge from bringing humility, gratitude, and curiosity to all we do. A missed opportunity for fun in these days that bring so much pain for so many is a real loss; a missed opportunity to create and spread joy together is worse. It is the latter that builds Beloved Community.

My heart is already so full of love and best wishes for you already I can't imagine what it will feel like to write my last of these letters a month from now! Another one of those things we'll find out together, I guess...Blessed be, Rev. B

CVUUS Race in America book series continues with

Asian American Histories of the United States by Catherine Ceniza Choy

The small group that gathered in April to discuss this book were so excited about all we learned that we wanted to share some it and encourage you to attend the **final session on Wed. May 17 at 7 pm on Zoom .**



Asian Americans are the **fastest growing ethnic group in the U.S.** and also have the **greatest economic disparity** within this group in the U.S.

• Larry Itliong and the Filipino American Farmworkers started what became known at the Delano Grape Strike in 1965. It lasted five years. Few of us have heard of him though you will likely recognize the name

Cesar Chavez who founded the National Farm Workers Association which was mostly Mexican farmworkers. Together with other labor organizers they created the **United Farm Workers Union**. Larry Itliong is known as one of the "fathers of the west coast labor movement" and a key figure in the Asian American Movement.

- Vermont Public's **Brave Little State** did a show on Nov. 4, 2022 called "What's the Asian American Experience in Vermont?" Learn more at their website.
- Neal Katyal, whose parents came to the US from India, has argued more US Supreme Court cases than any other minority lawyer in American history. Learn more about him by watching his interview on Tell Me More with Kelly Corrigan on the PBS website.
- Asian countries are the birthplace of **eleven major religions**. Can you name them?
- Japanese Americans were rounded up and sent to Relocation Centers in mostly rural western states from February 1942 to March 1946. More than 120,000 Japanese Americans were held captive for a minimum of three years. They lost their homes, businesses and neighborhoods though most of them were born in the U.S. and were U.S. citizens.
- There is a long history of U.S recruiting foreign-trained nurses. These have been predominantly in high population states including CA, NY, FL and NJ. In the mid-1990s 18% of registered nurses in NYC were Filipino and by 2016 Filipino RNs made up 18% of nurses in California. However, they are largely invisible to most Americans.



• Cecilia Suyat Marshall, born in Hawaii to Filipino immigrants, played a role in the Supreme Court decision Brown vs the Board of Ed. At the urging of her father she moved to NYC where an employment agency sent her to the office of the NAACP because of her dark skin. As a secretary there she spent many years typing and retyping the arguments as they were refined and eventually presented to the Supreme Court. She also met her husband, Thurgood Marshall, at the NAACP where he worked on the case.

Donating Funds from Your IRA Do you have a traditional IRA (Individual Retirement Account)? If so, then you've I made a deal with the Internal Revenue Service: Your IRA grows, tax free, until you reach a certain age (70½ if your 70th birthday was before July 1, 2019, and 72 if your 70th birthday was later). Starting with the year in which you reach that age, you're required to withdraw a minimum amount every year—the *required minimum distribution*, or RMD. There's a provision in the tax code that allows you to donate funds directly from your IRA to a qualified charity, like CVUUS. For more, ask Rich Wolfson.

Barnes Brook Community Forum Tuesday May 7, 7 PM, Sanctuary

Barnes Brook is a small, mostly urban stream located in the town of Middlebury. This lovely yet **largely unnoticed brook near CVUUS** and through MUHS hosts a valuable ecosystem that offers many communi-



ty services even as monitoring reveals it is polluted with phosphorus and salt. Come to a forum for your opportunity to become better acquainted with this dear little brook and for the community to begin to discuss strategies to value, protect and restore this natural resource. Contributions include Mary Hogan Elementary students on their experiences with the brook; River Watch on water quality results; Middlebury professors on the effects of salt on an aquatic ecosystem; UVM students' posters on proposed Green Stormwater Infrastructure; perspectives from the Conservation Commission; and one landowner's story about increasing protection of Barnes Brook through a riparian planting project.
