Minister's Letter




There's no way to fully express how grateful I am for the opportunity to have served as the Champlain Valley UU Society's minister for the past 11 years.

It would be a fool's errand as well to try to list all we have accomplished together. Yes, we transformed a dark basement into a welcoming Fellowship Hall, modern kitchen, and Library/Meeting Room and new bathrooms, with

elevator service between the them and the Sanctuary floor. Yes, we replaced the traditional fall auction fund-raiser with the unique and much more inclusive Radical Love Party. We also introduced new rituals like the Mud Communion that may or may not continue to evolve, as well as new Religious Exploration classes and events too numerous to mention. In the past year alone, we have seen unprecedented growth in our music program and adopted a new social action covenant that will serve us well in our ongoing work to dismantle racism and other oppressions.

But rather than go on, just focus on this: we accomplished this and more in the face of the unanticipated, global challenge of the Covid epidemic, growing threats to democracy, and other disruptive forces that pull people apart. Where did we so often find the strength to stand together? Early in my time with you, I wrote a

Call to Worship that I imagined you wanted spoken in your name. I sense

REMEMBERING GERRY IN RE

Gerry Loney was my amazing dad and a beloved member of our RE program for the past 10 years. As a RE leader, he brought deep respect and love for the kids. His time in RE was important to him and he did it with intention. He was funny and kind. He cared what kids thought about themselves and what they were doing. Their ideas were always asked for and used.

He LOVED weird ideas. He said yes whenever he could. He was real with kids — maybe the most real he was in life. He would do things in RE and when a kid said how cool it was, he would light up, say, "I know! It's so amazing!" and really mean it.

He (*like me*) especially loved RE groups that had a whole vibe to them. When I came up with the idea for *Undercover Kindness Agents*, he and I spent hours thinking about how to use passcodes to enter the room, if we needed special stationery (*obviously*), and how to have the kids find out about their kindness missions.



When he led *Harry Potter and UU*, he created a Hogwarts space in the basement, complete with potions, fake brick walls, wizard robes, and wands. He especially loved doing things with kids that had unknown outcomes like setting off rockets and seeing where they landed or having kids share their thoughts about important questions.

He did this all as someone who really tried to live his UU values in the world. I always say that the adults in RE should bring their true selves into the

room because that's what will let <u>them</u> grow the most and also what will give the most to the kids. My dad was a great example of this.

He will be deeply missed by all of us. We will honor his memory by

continuing to do weird and meaningful things in our RE program, as we try to be our true selves.

And – his cameo as "The Star" in our first/only Zoom Christmas Pageant was a thing of beauty.


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Climate Engagement Group:

Community Conversation: Affordable Housing for Addison County


<u>The bad news</u>: We have a housing crisis in Addison County. <u>The good news</u>: You can explore & support solutions.

Donating Funds from Your IRA Do you have a traditional IRA (Individual Retirement Account)? If so, then you've I made a deal with the Internal Revenue Service: Your IRA grows, tax free, until you reach a certain age (70½ if your 70th birthday was before July 1, 2019, and 72 if your 70th birthday was later). Starting with the year in which you reach that age, you're required to withdraw a minimum amount every year—the required minimum distribution, or RMD. There's a provision in the tax code that allows you to donate funds directly from your IRA to a qualified charity, like CVUUS. For more, ask Rich Wolfson.

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FROM YOUR CVUUS BOARD 2022-2023

Interim Minister Search Report

Because our regular called minister, Barnaby Feder, is retiring at the end of June, the CVUUS Board asked Alan Moore, Hannah Sessions, Kas Singh, Heidi Sulis and Tom Morgan to act as the Search Team for an Interim Minis-

ter to begin at CVUUS by Sept 2023. We studied what an Interim Minister is supposed to do, basically getting ready for our next called Minister by helping us to better define who we are and where we want to be in the next 5 to 10 years.

The UUA has a very prescribed system for carrying out this process, and most of our time centered on the period of late April to the middle of May when the UUA lets us know which ministerial applicants are interested in us. Before that time, we carried out some brief surveys of the Congregation to find out their desires for a future minister and let them know what the Search Team's timeline was, and what we were doing. We then developed a Congregational Record, by answering a very thorough questionnaire which was then shared by the UUA with interested ministers. We also developed an additional packet of information shared with those ministers who selected us as a congregation they might like to serve.

The Transitions Office then let us know on May 1st which ministers had expressed interest in CVUUS. There were three. We checked their ministerial record which gives us a lot of information about each minister's ministerial history, and their views on multiple issues relevant to an Interim Minister's role. We then conducted interviews with each applicant, using a set list of questions we had developed. *Talking to the references - UUs from all over the country – and then with the Ministers,* was an inspiring and motivating experience for us all, and left us with a very positive view of the future of UU. *This was undoubtedly the best part of the search process.*

After interviews, we needed to rank our applicants in order of our preference. We all agreed that all three applicants would be great for CVUUS, but that one stood out. The Transitions office then took our preferences and matched them with the minister's preferences. Unfortunately, on May 16th we were told that no match was able to be made. We were among 15 of 35 congregations that did not receive a match. All those congregations, including CVUUS, were then entered into the Contract Minister search, which began immediately. We are optimistic that this more flexible search system will lead to positive results for CVUUS.
