A Congregational Conversation: What Might Shared Ministry Look Like at CVUUS?



Following the service on Sun. Oct 22, about 30 CVUUS members and friends participated in a Congregational Conversation sponsored by the Council of Ministries and facilitated by Alan Moore and Rev. Tricia.

"Shared Ministry—What Is It?"

Rev. Tricia began with a brief introduction to the discussion, noting that ideas about shared ministry have been evolving for a number of years, and that most recently congregations and ministers have been exploring together what shared ministry and shared congregational leadership might look like at a time when ministers are redefining their roles and spiritual communities are transforming themselves in a variety of ways.

Rev. Tricia emphasized the fact that each congregation must define for itself what shared ministry and leadership might look like, based on its own needs and circumstances. At CVUUS, the Board has set a goal of exploring with the congregation this important question, in collaboration with the Council of Ministries.

Rev. Tricia asked participants to offer their own particular understandings of what shared ministry and leadership might look like, and a rich conversation including a number of thoughtful observations ensued. These included the notions that this congregation "belongs to its members" and that its particular history has reinforced this notion for many members. After about an hour of conversation, Rev. Tricia suggested that this particular discussion might best be understood as "the beginning of an ongoing conversation" which could profitably be pursued over the coming months in a variety of forums, perhaps including at Coffee Hour. And the Board invites anyone who wishes to engage in this continuing conversation to reach out to Board or Council of Ministry members with their thoughts and interest. Below is an excerpt from one congregation's response to the question of what Shared Ministry might mean, taken from the handout provided to participants at the Congregational Conversation:

What is Shared Ministry? Shared ministry lives out the affirmation that all people are called to ministry. As members of a faith community, we are invited to serve together in a spirit of mutuality as partners. Working cooperatively, we strive to discover, develop, utilize, and support the gifts of each person and, as responsible stewards, to participate in the ongoing creative and restoring activity in our communities and the world.

Gifts are given to us both as individuals and as a people, and the complementary nature of our gifts is essential for ministering. We are interdependent. We minister as partners. Partners produce an overspill of energy that is greater than the sum of the parts." —UU Community Church of Washington County, Hillsboro, OR

November "Share the Plate" Donee: Gedakina

Gedakina which means "Our world, a way of life" in the Wabanaki language, focuses on the challenges and hardships that Native American youth, women, and communities face daily, which are rooted in multi-generational expo-

sure to systemic poverty, oppression and violence. Gedakina is a multigenerational endeavor to strengthen and revitalize the cultural knowledge and identity of Native American women and their families from across New England. *"We work to conserve our traditional homelands and places of historical, ecological, and spiritual significance and to educate others as to their importance."* Gedakina initiatives focus on leadership development, education and cultural revitalization, including working with community organizations about how to give appropriate land acknowledgements, helping indigenous families around the Northeast become self-sufficient with Braiding Sweetgrass groups sharing traditional ecological knowledge, and providing educational opportunities in local schools to learn Indigenous language and heritage. 

Thanks for Amazing Migrant Worker Support

CVUUS transformed to host the **Mexican Consulate Visit** on Oct 28 with displays and food while legal documents, the main focus for workers, were processed. A record number of 164 families were serviced. Thanks to those who provided food and helped us throughout this VERY long day that was supposed to end at 3:30 but extended to 8:30 pm to allow for as many more unscheduled people as possible to be processed. So many more young families with babies and toddlers came this year (lots of newly arrived workers in our midst) and, sadly, so many unscheduled people came as early as 7:30 pm and as far as St Albans and the Northeast Kingdom who couldn't be served due to time constraints or lack of adequate ID such as needed birth certificates and proof of address.

Fortunately, families could enjoy refreshments including pumpkin muffins made by our RE children. They also enjoyed fellowship and visiting with the many wonderful local organizations on hand who could help them with health checks and vaccines, farm safety, legal aid, free clothing and housewares, English practice, banking, financial aid, Spanish masses and holiday events, and pathways from agriculture to other careers.

Middlebury College Juntos students were invaluable as Spanish speaking greeters and line workers to prepare people for their appointments and cover childcare. CVUUS' Mary Saudade single-handedly and cheerfully directed parking all morning. Lise Anderson provided much critical help in advance lining up volunteers and donations to assist Laura Asermily and Alan Moore who put in long hours in overseeing the day. We'll call for more hands on deck for an event of this growing size and demand where another visit or extra day is proposed as greatly needed, as well as a separate Guatemalan consult visit for a growing number of workers from this region in our midst. **ESL classes** for migrant women continue on Tuesdays and Thursdays

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(9-11) in Fellowship Hall. Follow efforts to support our migrant neighbors at cvuus.org here.
