





Burlington Shooting Response from our CVUUS Ministers

Dear People of CVUUS – Both of us were horrified and grief-stricken by the shooting of three young Palestinian American men in Burlington this past weekend. Like all of you, our hearts go out to their families, friends, and to all Palestinians and others who are victims of hatred and live in fear of being targeted. Our UU values call us to condemn racism and hate, and to work for peace – in our neighborhoods, our world, and in our own hearts.

On Monday, it was shocking to learn that the person charged with this terrible attack had recently been involved with programs at the UU Society in Burlington. After his picture and name appeared in the news, several CVUUS members remembered him attending and participating in programs here in Middlebury as well. Though details are incomplete, it seems clear he was occasionally present at CVUUS over a period of years, until about a year ago. He was never a member of either CVUUS or First UU in Burlington.

This whole event is upsetting for everyone, and triggering for some. Please take care of yourself and each other, and reach out to one of us, the staff or lay leaders if you want help processing this event.

Some of you are already thinking about ways CVUUS might support the victims of this tragedy, or be in solidarity with groups working for peace. If you can, come to church this Sunday Dec 3 – there will be time after the service for conversation.

Our colleague the Rev. Karen Johnston, Senior Minister at FUUSB, sent a letter to that congregation which reads, in part: As our Principles and Values call us to do, we denounce gun violence and how it shatters bodies, communities, safety, and trust. ... We denounce the rise of hatred based on religious or ethnic identity, and especially at this time, any targeting of Palestinians. Unitarian Universalist voices are important right now. We are so grateful to be here with all of you.





December "Share the Plate" Donee: Charter House Coalition

CHARTER HO C O A L I T

Charter House Coalition is a local organization which has been providing housing and meals to the homeless in the Middlebury area since 2005. Over the years, its importance has grown, as has the need. In 2019 Charter House provided almost 40,000 meals to hundreds of individuals and families. It housed 134 men, women and children. In 2020 of the pandemic, Charter House had to radically change its activities, serving three meals a day to people living in various locations around Middlebury, including its own residents. CVUUS makes dinner for residents (up to 35) on the second Monday of each month and lunch every second Wednesday of the month. It is constantly seeking funding in order to employ the staff and purchase the food and other supplies. CVUUS has always





ordinated with **HOPE** (**Helping Overcome Poverty's Effects**), a local non-profit whose mission is to reduce the effects of poverty in Addison County by providing low-income residents with opportunities for becoming more self reliant. Your support of our often unseen neighbors is greatly appreciated.

A Pilgrim's Progress

I started my spiritual journey as a child growing up in the Bible Belt with very strict parental beliefs which I quickly found to be troubling in my young life. Then, faced with the first huge trauma in my life - the tragic death of a brother four years younger when I was a student at Middlebury College - I was torn apart by grief and growing certainty that I was not interested in belief in a personal God who determined our individual fates.

As well as reading John Bunyan's classic in my college literature studies and readily adopting the analogy of life as a pilgrim searching for answers, I was also reading Emerson and Thoreau in American Literature class and learning first hand about Unitarianism when visiting a college roommate's family near Boston and going to UU services with them. My quest to understand my spirituality took on more direction and depth.

After graduation and marriage to a Middlebury classmate, we settled in the Burlington area becoming part of the UVM community. With thought and deliberation, we chose to raise our children in the First UU of Burlington, and thereby my own spiritual journey grew in the fullness of UU principals and their expression through our congregational involvement.

Tom's and my journey together became severely affected by his developing a Frontal Temporal Lobe Dementia which slowly caused him to lose all language, and eventually necessitated residential care. Five years ago with Tom at The Arbors in Shelburne and with my children's blessing, I set out, as a pilgrim, in body and soul and spirit, on the Camino Santiago, a 500 mile pilgrim walk since the Middle Ages across northern Spain. Over 36 days I devoted myself to physical and emotional challenges, drawing insight and understanding through daily journal writing, talking with fellow pilgrim travelers, and sharing it all in my mind with Tom, who was very much with me on a powerful experiential learning trip. I returned home and experienced a strong spiritual connection with Tom as he died.

Explore Small Ministry Groups:A Different Way to Do Church



In September, both the CVUUS Board of Trustees and the Council of Ministries developed a series of goals to guide us for this church year, a year of transition in many ways. Both groups decided that dealing with **our long-term financial situation was a priority**. A continuing trend of not meeting our canvass goals was the primary motivation for this, but the Board and Council are also concerned with long term trends in church membership and volunteerism, not just at CVUUS, but with most churches in general. These trends greatly affect our ability to raise the funds needed to keep our church operating at the level which we are accustomed to.

The Board decided that we should establish a task force to look at some of these issues and come up with recommendations for confronting them. Ten members of the Congregation volunteered to be a part of this Long-Term Financial Health task force. Rev. Tricia is acting as a consultant. The Board prepared a Charge for the Task Force to address the following:

- What has made current canvass/ stewardship campaigns successful or not, and what suggestions can be made for improving our mechanisms for raising the funding needed to run CVUUS.
- What long-term structural issues are impacting CVUUS finances?
- Are there ways we can improve our overall financial health aside from the annual funds drives and events?
- Are CVUUS expenses consistent with current and future income expectations? Can we be more effective at how we spend our money?
- How might the Team invite broad congregational engagement?
- In summary, what actions must CVUUS take in order to have a more sustainable financial situation? The Board would like the Task Force to present a final report in time for our annual meeting in June 2024. However, recommendations will probably emerge as we study and reach conclusions on the topics included in our Charge. Submitted by Alan Moore


