A lot of work goes into the Pageant, especially considering its "norehearsal" quality. The space is set up, costumes are put out, scripts are revised, and much, much more. All done at a very busy time of the year. Every year, I wonder if it's too much to do? But then I look at the photos and see just how many people – of all ages – are completely grinning in them. Because – costumes! Animal ears! How often do we get to PLAY together? It's wonderfully multigenerational with an even split of kids and adults involved (though the grinniest people are often the adults).



My kids grew up here at CVUUS and with the tradition of the Pageant. I watched them graduate from Angel to Narrator, as I have watched other kids. My heart...



Some favorite 2023 Pageant moments: two very tall boy angels who will graduate from high school this year, parent and child duos sitting side by side, how close we were to a Pageant without a Mary and baby Jesus (!), how very carefully the Wise People placed their gifts in the manger next to the baby, the Religious Ex-

I love this moment, where we are all holding the space, singing in the darkened beautifully lit room. It's magical. It is worth it, the work of it. Though perhaps the stable has enough birds now?



Thank you for being my circle of light at the end of the Pageant.





What Are Our Next Steps? CVUUS Board has hired UUA's Mark Ewert of Stewardship for Us to guide our vision for CVUUS toward our long-term financial health. He worked recently with Burlington UU. He'll be meeting the weekend of Jan 19-21 with the Board and its recently formed Long-Term Financial Health task force with Rev. Tricia consulting and other CVUUS leaders. The Board charged the Task Force to address the following:

- What has made current canvass/ stewardship campaigns successful or not, and what suggestions can be made for improving our mechanisms for raising the funding needed to run CVUUS.
- What long-term structural issues are impacting CVUUS finances?
- Are there ways we can improve our overall financial health aside from the annual funds drives and events?
- Are CVUUS expenses consistent with current and future income expectations? Can we be more effective at how we spend our money?
- How might the Team invite broad congregational engagement?
- What actions must CVUUS take in order to have a more sustainable financial situation?







CARE FOR SAFETY. In increment weather, you can stay home and follow us remotely. Sanctuary doors will be **locked after worship be-gins** with the Safety Volunteer admitting latecomers and the usher directing them to reserved seating in the back to minimize disrupting the service.

CARE FOR YOUR HEALTH! The Safety Team cautions you that respiratory infections (not just COVID!) are on the rise and it's prudent for those at risk to wear masks (KN95 remains best). Testing is fundamental if you have symptoms or feel you've been exposed. We have extra COVID tests if they are needed which we keep in our sanctuary closet. It's worth the effort to get the new more effective COVID booster. People have been successful at Walgreens (both Middlebury and Rutland). Remember to use our ventilation systems when meeting (air purifiers, mechanical ones in sanctuary). May you be well and call on us if you need help with any of this.
