Feb 4—Love & Money—We all know how important love is (or how important we want it to be) in our lives. As Unitarian Universalists, we proclaim **love** as a guiding principle in all of our choices ... and sometimes we can even live that way. Money is another very strong influence in our lives (whether we want it to be or not). How can love and money work together? Led by Rev. Tricia

Feb 11—Universalism: The Heart of Our Faith—Are you a Universalist? Rev. Christina helps us explore the history and theology of Universalism and how relevant and necessary it is today.

Feb 18—Between Memory and Hope "Beloved Community" is a term of art that we UUs use sometimes to characterize religious communities. What's it supposed to mean? Where did it come from? Beloved of or by whom? Are you "in" or "out"? How can one be sure? Should it even apply to our UU congregations; and what, by the way, has **Love** (CVUUS' theme for February) got to do with it? Rev. Peter Newport, Rev. Tricia's partner, takes a deep dive into the philosophy and social criticism of Josiah Royce to suggest some answers, or at least some better questions.

Feb 25—Putting Love at the Center—As you know by now, UUA (that's us!) is engaged in a process of reviewing and updating the foundational statement that says what UUism is, in our time. In a characteristically UU way, we are being invited to help determine language that captures what our religion is about... which is as close as we get to answering the question "What Do UUs Believe?" What do you think? How will it matter to CVUUS in the years to come? Led by Rev. Tricia. More inside.

Are you curious, or apprehensive, or excited about the ongoing UUA initiative to update "Article 2" of our UUA bylaws? (Do you

know why the UUA Bylaws might matter, to you?)

Article 2 of the UUA Bylaws is where our UU Principles are found. You can remember what the principles say at <a href="https://www.uua.org/beliefs/what-we-believe/principles">https://www.uua.org/beliefs/what-we-believe/principles</a> and newsletter cover. Many of us (including me) cite these seven principles as one reason we chose to become UU. So, they matter!

The UU Principles are strong statements high-



lighting the centrality of our faithful commitments to respect life and all of humanity; to the truth that everyone, everywhere, has a right to justice, freedom, equity, compassion and peace. They affirm the "interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part." An 8<sup>th</sup> Principle was proposed a few years ago as a commitment to build Beloved Community, as our congregations "accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions." Several hundred congregations have so far voted to adopt the 8<sup>th</sup> Principle in their own legal documents, including CVUUS.

Here's what's happening now: the very same UUA Bylaws that contain the Principles also call on us to review those Principles and Purposes and Sources (all of Article 2) at least every 15 years. The wise founders of the UUA knew life does not stay the same – ideas shift, cultures modernize, and world events affect all of us, and our planet. The statement of our core principles needs to reflect what matters most to Unitarian Universalists, today. Sometimes, that means they need to change.

An Article 2 Commission has been working for years on a revision of our principles, with lots of feedback from UUs everywhere. The goal is make them more inclusive of different generations and backgrounds; more focused on our lives not just as individuals but our life in community. The central ideas of all the current UU Principles are incorporated into in a simple, beautiful design, with Love at the center. I think you'll come to like it as much as I do.

Do you have questions about Unitarian Universalism – where we came from, what challenges and opportunities we're facing now, and in the future? I hope you do, and that you'd like to talk about it – with each other and with me! Mark your calendars for a special Congregational Conversation after the service on Sunday, February 25, hosted by the Council on Ministries and the Membership Team – Everything You'd Like to Know About Unitarian Universalism.

It's an exciting time, full of opportunity. Our faith is an ever evolving one, always striving to be relevant, and at the forefront of what the world needs today. That's what we mean when we say we are a "living tradition."

There is a proposed new version of the Principles and Sources. Our current UU values would become "Values", with Love at the center. BIG love. Jet Pig, amazingly enough, just happens to have a name that can help us remember the proposed 6 Values:


## **Host at Gather (Drop-In Community Space)**

February "Share the Plate" Donee: Black Church Food Security Network

The Black Church Food Security Network (BCFSN) is the fruit of Maxine's Garden at Pleasant Hope Baptist Church in Baltimore, MD and now a network of Black churches organized

to advance health, wealth, and power for our people. They partner with historically African American congregations to establish or expand gardens or agricultural projects, such as rainwater collection or compost systems, on church-owned land.

Connecting the vast inventory of church-owned land with agricultural initiatives can provide a myriad of health-related, environmental, and economic benefits to the African American community and beyond. They provide training, technical assistance, and seed funding to member churches around the US (including VT). Through the Soil to Sanctuary Market, they partner with congregations to bring miniature farmer's markets to churches

on days that they worship or gather.

Their commitment to Black farmers goes far beyond the sale. They believe that transformative relationships are necessary to confront and overcome the kind of discrimination that Black farmers have faced for 100 years. So while they help groups

to buy from Black farmers, they also work to have congregations "adopt" Black farmers; to invest in their farm operations, provide spiritual support, serve as advocates, and be partners far beyond the point of sale. More at https://blackchurchfoodsecurity.net/

Thanks to Abolition Kitchen, started by Joanna Colwell (pictured) and Caitlin Gildrien who along with Michele Lowy and

others, take turns providing nutritious meals for our local Black and BIPOC families. It started about 3 years ago being once a week and then transitioned to once a month. Joanna offers challah often and helps to lead Middlebury Showing Up for Racial Justice.


